Notes from the Chair

The Town will be acting on the budget in the next few months. We receive calls regarding the tax bills and budget. It is important to remember that Town taxes are a separate item on your tax bill and usually the smallest of the tax appropriations. We have no control over the taxes levied by the schools, County or State.

There is a lot of interest in our road improvement projects every year. These are determined by a statistical rating of the roads most in need of repair. We then plan those projects based on the amount of money available in our budget. It is important to remember that we operate on a State-restricted budget and cannot appropriate all the money necessary to repair all the roads that need repair in any one year. As an example, those considerations were discussed regarding the Druid Lake Road flooding of last year. I know some have been inquiring as to what the Town is doing with the road and culvert. We studied that and found that the flow of water under the current road did not cause obstruction, and that other bridges, including the old highway, were on private property. The Town, therefore, has not appropriated funds to work on that roadway.

Plan Commission

Projects this year include updating our zoning code. When that is done, and in code form, we must compare it to the comprehensive plan and reconcile any differences in order to have a consistent unified Town Plan. Also, we are finishing the new zoning map. These efforts take time and money but should be done by spring of next year.

We did hear some concern that the Town was forging ahead with approvals for additional holes at Erin Hills Golf Course. As was stated to those who were concerned, that is not true. The Plan Commission reviewed a preliminary plan from Erin Hills for additional holes, for comment only. The Commission saw little that required any comment and viewed those preliminary plans favorably. That was all; no plans have been submitted and no approvals granted.

News from the Clerk

There will be no elections held this fall. Next spring, we will have two Town Supervisor seats up for local elections.

The Town has started its budget process. The Executive Committee will recommend a proposed budget to the Town Board at its October meeting, and then it will go to the residents to vote on at the Budget meeting held in November before the regularly scheduled Town Board Meeting.

Watch for tax collection times with your property tax bills in the middle of December. There will be NO tax collections on December 31st this year, so please make sure you mail your payment by the 31st for credit in 2009. We will accept the postmark. If you need a receipt, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope. The Clerk's office cannot issue receipts for payments dropped off at the Town Hall. Receipts are issued after the Treasurer processes the payments.

Address Signs

The Town began its address sign program back in October 2003. At that time, all new construction was required to purchase a sign and the Town would install it. These can be seen around the Town as the white-on-green reflective signs that have "Town of Erin" at the top, and the address below. To date, most of the Town has had them installed. In August, the northwest and north central areas of the Town were done. The only area that remains is the far southwest area of the Town, which is in the Ashippun Fire District. I plan on putting that in the 2010 budget, and at that time, the entire Town will be done.

Please keep the signs visible for our emergency responders, and do not move or otherwise modify them. It is a violation of Town ordinances to do so. If they get damaged or need to be replaced, please contact me.

In the course of ordering address signs and going out and looking at roads and addresses, I have found that some things done in the past make existing addresses and road names in some areas confusing. Addresses used to be assigned based on the position of the home, instead of the location of the driveway. This makes for areas where the addresses run out of sequential order. Also in the past, private outlot roads did not require names, and the houses used addresses from the adjoining public road. This has caused situations where in some cases, there are no address numbers that can be assigned to parcels that need them. These deficiencies have been corrected by an ordinance I authored several years ago.

Addresses are assigned by driveway position, so every residence runs sequentially, and outlot private roads with four or more residences on them must have a road name and street sign, and addresses on that road. There have been a few instances where addresses must be changed. The homeowners will be notified and we will try to work out a solution. The goal is to make it easier for emergency crews to find a residence. There is no GPS or any other way for emergency responders to find a particular residence better than locating it with an address sign.

2010 And Beyond

I am also working on the budget for 2010. In 2009, the new county radio system is expected to come online, and I am looking at purchasing some new radios for Emergency Management, so we will be able to communicate with our surrounding communities and emergency responders. Our current radios are obsolete, and we won't be able to use them after 2012, due to FCC rules.

Fire dues for Hartford will stabilize in 2010, as we will reach the 75% mill rate ratio as stated in the intermunicipal agreement. After next year, any increase in fees will be solely dependent on the increase in the equalized value of improvements in the Town. As a result, increases should not be as dramatic as we have seen the past few years.

Burning Ordinance

Copies of the Town's burning ordinance are available from the Town, but here are the main points:

- No burning permits are required
- When fire danger is high, very high, or severe all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks) by order of the emergency management director, or Town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exemption. For such a ban, I will notify the sheriff's department and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the Town posting boards, and on the website.

At any time of year:

- Open fires must be attended
- The Fire Department or preferably the Sheriff's Department must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over ¼ acre).
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface, and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items, as they pose a health hazard to residents.

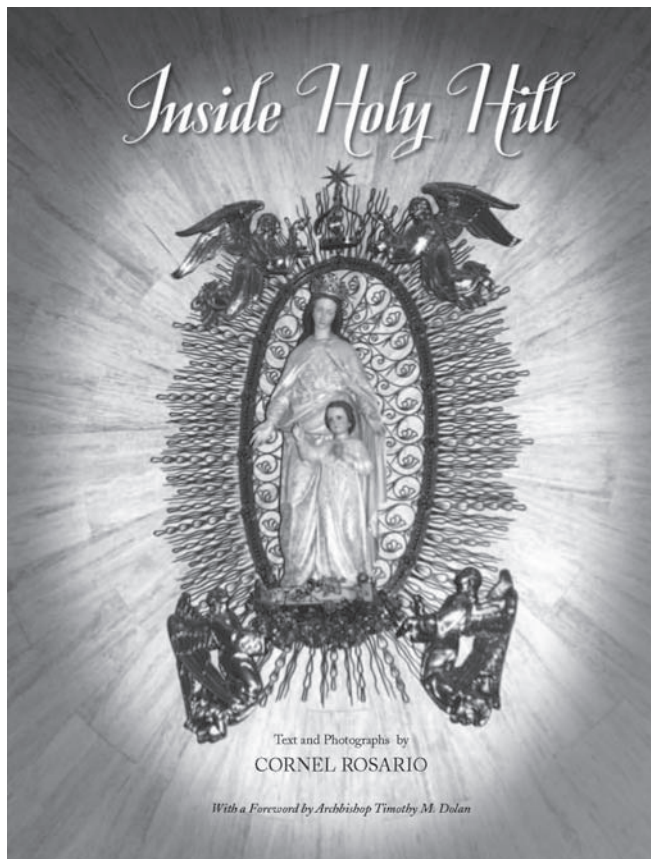

***Inside Holy Hill* Book Released**

A long-expressed need has finally been met: The Holy Hill Gift Shop is pleased to announce the release of *Inside Holy Hill*, a glossy, coffee-table book profusely illustrated with 150 color photographs, many of them full-page.

Archbishop Timothy Dolan has provided a touching Foreword to the book, whose author and photographer is Cornel Rosario, a long-time resident of the Town of Erin.

Inside Holy Hill covers the time span from the formation of the conical hill on which the current shrine was constructed, through the recently-completed renovations and landscape beautification projects on the Holy Hill property.

Over the past 150 years, pilgrims and visitors have come in ever-increasing numbers to pray at the shrine dedicated to Mary, Help of Christians. The book takes the reader through each of the three shrines that have been built successively on the summit of Holy Hill.

There is an illustrated tour of the grounds, the various chapels, and the main church itself. The book describes the history of the Carmelite Order and provides an account of a typical day in the life of a Carmelite friar. It concludes with accounts of healings reported to have taken place at Holy Hill, and the heartfelt testimonies of visitors describing why they are attracted to Holy Hill.

Hartford Public Library

The Hartford Public Library invites all Erin residents to visit the Library to enjoy a wide variety of materials plus educational and entertaining programs. The Library is located on the top floor of the Hartford City Hall at 109 N. Main Street in downtown Hartford. Parking is available in the back of the facility off Johnson Street. The Library's doors are open to all residents of Washington and Dodge Counties. Library cards are issued free of charge by just providing an ID with a current address. Children in Grades K through 8 may also get cards with parental permission. The process takes about five minutes. The Library offers a selection of over 115,000 books, 175 magazine subscriptions, almost 5,000 audio-books in both cassette and compact disc format, 1,500 DVDs and 3,500 videos plus many musical CDs for both adults and children.

The Library offers six public Internet workstations that can be used for an hour per day. The Library's school year hours are Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM until 8:30 PM, and on Saturdays from 9:00 AM until 5:00 PM. Access to the Library's database can be found at www.hartfordlibrary.org on the web, and staff can be emailed at hartfordpl@hartfordlibrary.org.

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The Library is part of the 44-library SHARE consortium, offering direct access to almost 3 million titles. Check out the current library, and get information regarding the plans for the new Jack Russell Memorial Library. Questions can be asked by calling 282-673-8240 during regular business hours.



Preschool story hours for children ages 3 to 5 are held every Wednesday morning beginning at 10:00 AM, lasting for approximately 45 minutes. Each week features a different theme, and children are treated to stories, puppet shows, sing-a-longs and a weekly craft project. There is no sign-up required; just visit on the days that work for you.

Special programs for school-aged children are frequently held, with Library information found in the Hartford Booster, Times-Press, on radio station WTKM, and on the Library's website. The Friends of the Hartford Library will offer three programs on widely different topics this fall. On September 16, author Chad Lewis will discuss Haunted Wisconsin, the supernatural side of the Badger State. On October 14, Dr. James Raymond will present the story of Civil War medicine, complete with soldiers' attire and the doctors' tools of the trade. On November 4, the story of Dr. Rosa Minoka-Hill, America's first Indian physician, will be portrayed by Carol Smart. This is a great session for children studying American Indian culture in school. All three programs are offered free of charge. These sessions will be held in the Library's Meeting Room, and all are on Wednesday evenings starting at 7:00 PM.

Planning and fundraising efforts continue for the new Jack Russell Memorial Library in Hartford. The Capital Campaign has received donations and pledges totaling over \$1.2 million dollars in the first seven months of work, achieving 60% of the \$2 million goal. The 35,500 square foot, two-story library on the Mill Pond site has an estimated price tag of \$10 million that is proposed to be paid for half by City tax levy, and half by donations and library revenues. Washington County taxes provide library access for rural residents and will not be impacted by a new library building in Hartford. The Hartford City Council confirmed its \$5 million financial support and established a construction timetable: 2010, ground remediation; 2011, begin construction; 2012, dedication, on the exact site where Hartfordites and Erin residents attended high school for seven decades from early in the 20th century.
